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



Signs Say Something!

A sign on a building that proclaims "Cracker Barrel" says something to me. When needing or desiring the services of a restaurant, the words "Cracker Barrel" have special meaning. Yes, when it comes to eating, the sign out front says something.

Personal experience has taught me to expect certain things when visiting anyone of nearly 600 stores and/or restaurants. When my June and I visit Cracker Barrel, we expect friendly people, good home-style country cooking, an open fireplace, walls covered with antiques, rocking chairs, checker games, no alcoholic drinks, fair prices and the privilege of two people sharing just one order. We also have learned to appreciate the fact that Cracker Barrel is "RV friendly." Yes, their sign says something.

Wal*mart

A Walmart sign on a building says something to me. When needing or desiring groceries, clothing and/or household items the word "Walmart" has special meaning. Yes, the sign out front says something.

Personal experience has taught us, over several years, to expect certain things when visiting anyone of the more than 3,800 Walmart stores in the nation. We expect to find at Walmart's SuperCenters just about anything or everything we need for food, the house, the yard and the car. We have come to expect, maybe "not the best of services" but what may be considered a "fair price." We have also learned to appreciate the fact that Walmart is also "RV friendly."

"Church of Christ"

When I see a sign on or near

a building which declares, "Church of Christ [Meets Here]", it says something to me. When my June and I decide to enter a building, where folks assemble under the banner "church of Christ", we have come to expect certain things. We expect to find people who are friendly, loving and caring -- who truly love the Lord and their "neighbors" (John 13:34,35; cf. Mark 12:28-31).

Over many years, we have come to expect to find worship services on the Lord's Day that are simple; yet, very scriptural and uplifting. We expect to see a people who give attention to the weekly observance of the Lord's Supper (I Corinthians 10:14-22; 11:17-24; Acts 20:7). We expect to be given an opportunity to join in with the congregation in praising God and edifying one another in "psalms, hymns and spiritual songs" (Eph. 5:19; Col. 3:16). And, inasmuch as the church of the first century used only vocal music in worship, we have come to expect the Lord's people in our century to sing praises without the accompaniment of mechanical instruments of music. (No authority for the use of instrumental music in the worship of Christians to God can be found

in the New Testament.)

In choosing to worship with a people known as churches of Christ, we have come to expect fervent prayers led only by men and Bible studies in classes and sermons taught by qualified males (I Timothy 2:8-13). We expect the Bible is to be the basis and the very center of all instructional and educational matters in the church and we expect a "thus saith the Lord" to be gladly given in support of all doctrinal and moral issues.

In a world with many different offerings -- whether in places to *eat*, places to *shop* or places to *worship*, a sign seems to have a vital place. This is especially true when words of a sign are used to identify a place or a people of worship.

Back in the first century A.D., when followers of Christ were taught to respect the will of the Lord that "there be no divisions among you" (I Cor. 1:10), and reverenc the prayer of Jesus that His disciples all "be one" (John 17:20-21), and when there was but "one body" [church] (Eph. 4:4;1:22,23), and in a time when church buildings, as such, were unknown, signs were probably not considered that important.

While there is no specific "name" given to the church of the New Testament; yet, some means of identification seems almost necessary in a world filled with conflicting and confusing churches and teachings. So, even though it takes much more than a sign to represent those who make up Christ's true church; yet, can we not agree that a sign says something?

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Bible Questions Answered

QUESTION: I have never been a member of a congregation which disfellowshipped anyone; yet the Bible says a great deal about church discipline. Why do you suppose this command is so widely ignored? (F. R.)

Yesterday some friends of mine were kicked out of church because they drank and didn't always go to church regularly. Is the church allowed to do that? I thought God was the only one who could do that. (P. M.)

RESPONSE: These two questions, which are representative of several received about this issue, illustrate the wide divergence of feelings about this biblical teaching.

No doubt one of the errors frequently associated with the biblical teaching of church discipline is that some congregations simply ignore it. However, the implication sometimes heard that there are blatant sinners in every congregation that need to be disfellowshipped is, in my opinion, a misunderstanding of the nature of church discipline as a whole and of the kind of person to whom withdrawal of fellowship needs to be applied.

In some cases it is applied too quickly or precipitously and in some cases inconsistently. In still other cases it may be unscrupulously used as a tool of an authoritarian preacher or eldership to keep people in line.

Phrases like "kicked out of church" betray a serious misunderstanding of what should be a patient, loving process designed to save a soul as well as to protect the good name and influence of a congregation.

What Is Church Discipline?

Definition number one of "discipline" in the Oxford Universal Dictionary is "Instruction imparted to disciples or scholars; teaching; learning; education." It is only at definitions seven and eight that ideas related to punishment and ecclesiastical enforcement of church order are mentioned. Anytime a congregation is engaged in teaching, encouraging, correction, or admonishing, especially as it relates to behavior of individuals, it is practicing church discipline.

Withdrawal of Fellowship

Only rarely does a situation reach a point where a person needs to be disfellowshipped.

A good starting place to see what the Bible says about that is in chapter 5 of Paul's apostolic letter, called 1 Corinthians.

Paul told the Corinthians, "It is actually reported that there is sexual immorality among you, and of a kind that is not tolerated even among pagans, for a man has his father's wife. And you are arrogant! Ought you not rather to mourn? Let him who has done this be removed from among you" (1 Corinthians 5:1-3).

Throughout the rest of the chapter he uses several other expressions equivalent to "let him be removed from among you": "deliver this man to Satan for the destruction of the flesh" (5:5); " cleanse out the old leaven" (5:7); "not to associate with," twice (5:9 and 5:11); "not even to eat with" (5:11); and "Purge the evil person from among you" (5:13).

First, a further comment on two of the expressions.

The last one, "Purge the evil person from among you," is cited from Deuteronomy where it appears at least seven times, 13:5; 17:7; 17:12; 21:21; 22:21; 22:22; 22:24. In Deuteronomy the "purging" is done by capital punishment!

An expression similar to "deliver to Satan for the destruction of the flesh" is also used by Paul in his first letter to Timothy concerning some false teachers. "By rejecting this, some have made shipwreck of their faith, among whom are Hymenaeus and Alexander, whom I have handed over to Satan that they may learn not to blaspheme" (1 Timothy 1:19-20).

"Deliver to Satan" in 1 Corinthians 5 is obviously parallel with the other expressions referring to withdrawing fellowship from and therefore certainly means the same thing, which in turn throws light on the meaning in 1 Timothy.

What is very clear from this chapter is that, in this case of an unrepentant, grossly immoral brother, the church was told to refuse to allow him continued acceptance and fellowship as a faithful brother.

Why Not Done More Often?

The Corinthians, Paul said, "were arrogant" (v. 2) and "boasting" that they tolerated this sin in their fellowship (v. 6).

Perhaps in this day when tolerance seems to be the only virtue to be celebrated and intolerance the only sin to be condemned, except that intolerance of anything perceived to be intolerance is not only tolerated but encouraged, there may be a valuable lesson for us.

The grace of God is a great thing of which to boast. Indeed, Scripture suggests it is the only thing of which we have a right to boast. "But far be it from me to boast except in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ" (Galatians 6:14).

However, there are warnings, too. "Where sin increased, grace

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abounded all the more" (Romans 5:20), but that does not mean that we are "to continue in sin that grace may abound" (Romans 6:1).

Jude says there are "people who pervert the grace of our God into sensuality and deny our only Master and Lord, Jesus Christ" (Jude 4). KJV translates it "turning the grace of our God into lasciviousness."

Note 1 Corinthians 5:6, "Your boasting is not good." Toleration of sin, whatever the excuse, is never something of which to be proud. God's grace is amazing! But grace must not be used to excuse continued rebellious participation in gross immorality, by us or by others.

A Clear Command

In this case Paul uses his apostolic authority and firmly and clearly commands: "For though absent in body, I am present in spirit; and as if present, I have already pronounced judgment on the one who did such a thing. When you are assembled in the name of the Lord Jesus and my spirit is present, with the power of our Lord Jesus, you are to deliver this man to Satan for the destruction of the flesh, so that his spirit may be saved in the day of the Lord" (1 Corinthians 5:3-5).

Purposes of Withdrawal

The point of the exercise is "that his spirit may be saved in the day of the Lord." When the similar expression is used in 1 Timothy, it is "that (Hymenaeus and Alexander) may learn not to blaspheme."

To the Thessalonians Paul wrote, "If anyone does not obey what we say in this letter, take note of that person, and have nothing to do with him, that he may be ashamed." Again the intended effect is to change the one toward whom the action is directed. The next verse speaks to the attitude with which the whole process is to be conducted. "Do not regard him as an enemy, but warn him as a brother" (2 Thessalonians 3:14-15).

Throughout Scripture discipline is always designed for correction.

However, another purpose is to protect the church from the contamination of sin. "Do you not know that a little leaven leavens the whole lump? Cleanse out the old leaven that you may be a new lump, as you really are unleavened" (1 Corinthians 5:6b-7a). Unrestrained sin influences others to sin.

A third purpose relates to the influence of the church in the world. The world may ridicule the church for its stand against sin and will try very hard to entice Christians into sin, but when they succeed and Christians fall, the world loses respect for the church. The church must be "in the world but not of the world" for the sake of the world, as well as for the sake of the church.

Misuses of Withdrawal

One obvious deviation from biblical teaching on this subject is a simple failure to apply it when it needs to be followed.

Others, however, seem to think of it as a tool of first resort wherever there is any disagreement of action, doctrine or opinion, and that is an equal deviation from biblical teaching on this subject.

There were many errors and serious sins prevalent in Corinth that Paul dealt with in 1 Corinthians. In addition to the immoral man sleeping with his father's wife, there was division based on carnal attitudes and preacheritis (chapters 1--3); there were brothers using pagan judges to defraud their brethren (6:1-8); there was additional rampant sexual immorality (6:9-20); some had desecrated the Lord's supper turning it into a drunken gluttonous feast (11); speakers in tongues and women were speaking out in unedifying and shameful ways in the assemblies (14); and some at Corinth were denying there was a resurrection from the dead (15).

Paul certainly wrote to correct all of these problems, but despite varying degrees of severity, the only sin for which he counseled withdrawal of fellowship at the time was the flagrant immorality in chapter 5.

"Church discipline" is faithfully practiced in a great number of congregations today that may never see an instance of withdrawal of fellowship. Withdrawal of fellowship is the end of a number of steps, all of which are designed to produce results and keep withdrawal of fellowship from having to occur.

Withdrawal of fellowship is not a cure for immaturity. Babes need

to be fed with milk and not with strong meat, slowly introduced to unfamiliar phrases and concepts, shielded from some things they are not yet able to bear.

Withdrawal of fellowship is not a cure for ignorance or for the honestly mistaken. They need to be taught, persuaded, and reasoned with from the Scripture.

Withdrawal of fellowship is not helpful in dealing with the discouraged. They need to be encouraged, exhorted and edified.

Withdrawal of fellowship is for those who "bear the name of brother" who are "guilty of sexual immorality or greed, or is an idolator, reviler, drunkard or swindler" (1 Corinthians 5:11).

It is not intended to be the initial reaction to the discovery of a brother's first infraction, but is something that occurs only at the end of a lengthy process designed to correct a continued course of sinful actions.

Jesus suggested several prior steps. "If your brother sins against you, go and tell him his fault, between you and him alone. If he listens to you, you have gained your brother. But if he does not listen, take one or two others along with you, that every charge may be established by the evidence of two or three witnesses. If he refuses to listen to them, tell it to the church. And if he refuses to listen even to the church, let him be to you as a Gentile and a tax collector" (Matthew 18:15-17).

In the beginning this deals with a private offence but by step two it has become more public.

(I remember telling a brother who held a grudge against another brother and had hardly spoken to him for years, though they worshipped together in the same congregation, that the Lord required him to follow this procedure. He said, "Oh, it wasn't important enough to go through all of that."

Well, he was probably right in his assessment of it, but that certainly means it was not important enough to carry a grudge about for years either.)

Note that the third step is "tell it to the church." As is clear from what follows, that is not an announcement of withdrawal of fellowship. It is an attempt to enlist the whole church into the effort to get the offender to repent so that withdrawal will not be necessary.

Only after "he refuses to listen even to the church" does the church count him "as a Gentile and a tax collector."

Paul told Titus "As for a person who stirs up division, after warning him once and then twice, have nothing more to do with him" (Titus 3:10).

Withdrawal of fellowship is not an immediate reaction to a brother's or sister's sin. It is the end of a long process of trying to get them to repent and return.



Webster's Dictionary defines courage as "the quality of being brave: the ability to face danger, difficulty, uncertainty, or pain

without being overcome by I can fear." remember back to my early high school football days when my coach told me as a freshman that if I was to succeed then I must accept the challenges ahead and face them with strength, courage, and

endurance. I had to get stronger and become mentally awake. He said the best thing for me to do was to give it time and observe the upper classmen. To a small extent that was discouraging news.

At first I wasn't optimistic, however, in time I found encouragement in the seniors. They challenged me to go beyond my abilities and to exceed the expectation. In time, when the seniors had graduated I slowly began to realize that if I wanted to succeed then I had to give it all I had. My heart was anxious to get in the game. Through the test of time, I did.

Have you studied ever Joshua? faced a daunting challenge. After the children of Israel had finally made it to the border of Canaan they were told some discouraging Their famous leader

Moses wasn't going with them into the Promised Land. After Moses died the Lord spoke to Joshua, Moses' assistant, and said that he would lead the people into battle against the Canaanites (Joshua 1:2).

The Bible says that Joshua was told four times by the Lord to "be strong and courageous" (Joshua 1:6, 7, 9, 18). I remember the words of courageous Caleb who said, "Let us go up at once, and possess it; for we are well able to overcome it" (Numbers 13:30). Through the test of time, Joshua and the Israelites succeeded (Joshua 21:43).

The story of young David is quiet telling! In I Samuel 17, the Bible tells of Israel's engagement with mighty Goliath. Goliath was

a man greatly feared. Who could face this awesome being? Young David, the shepherd boy, accepted the challenge (I Samuel 17:32)!

King Saul told David that he



God. As a result, David succeeded (I Samuel 17:45, 46).

How did these men triumph over such odds? They put their trust in God and made the decision to take ACTION! They calculated the steps for success. They faced the uncertainty with courage, and the difficulties with strength. With God on their side, they succeeded (Romans 8:31).

Will you accept the challenges that come in your life? Are you facing difficulties with strength and courage? Do you contend for the faith (Jude 3)? If not, seek the kingdom first (Matthew 6:33),

Be Hospitable to One Another

"Use hospitality one to another without grudging.' (1 Peter 4:9)

- Eddie Lewis -

In Scripture there are several verses that use the phrase "One another." These words describe

special activities that would enable the body of Christ function effectively and grow spiritually. The Greek word is "allelon." It is used some 58 times in the New Testament, 40 of these by Paul alone. If you took references and put

them all together according to their meaning, they can be placed into twelve significant actions that Christians are to take toward "one another" in building the body of Christ. One of these actions is hospitality.

First, it is important to remember that Paul points out that we have a mutual obligation to each other in the church. He uses the illustration of the body to talk about it (1 Corinthians 12, Romans 12). He plainly says we are one. No one is above the other. All are important (1 Corinthians 12:12-16. 25-27). We have different works and different gifts, but even the less important works are held in high esteem in the Body (v. 23). Our relationship is that we rejoice with those rejoicing and suffer with those that are suffering. We support each other because we are "member of one another" (Romans

Let's look at one of these relationships, "Be hospitable to one another without complaint" (1 Peter 4:9). The word "hospitable" is defined as: "Receiving and entertaining guests generously and kindly; liberally receptive. From this definition we understand that it is an attitude of the heart that Peter is talking about. It is being generous toward others. This generosity is of the liberal kind. In other words we give of ourselves to others beyond what is normally expected.

Consider some verses that support this definition and tell us why we are to practice it. First is Peter's statement in our text (1 Peter 4:9). He tells about Christ sacrifice for us and our sacrifice for Him. He tells us to "arm yourselves also with the same mind or purpose" (v.1). What was Christ attitude? In verses 8 and 9 Peter tells us two attitudes we are to have if we are

to be like Christ. Love each other and practice hospitality. We are to serve each other generously and without grumbling. Sometimes people try to excuse themselves from hospitality by saying, "My house is not nice enough to have guest over" or "My house is too

> s m a 1 1. Hospitality is an attitude; about the spirit of giving to others and not about the size of your house.

Another passage is Paul's statement Romans chapter twelve (Romans 12:13). In the beginning of the chapter Paul challenges us to give

ourselves to God as a living sacrifice. He gives the qualities of that type of Christian in verses 9-21. Consider the list: "Love, hate evil, be affectionate to each other, zeal, serve the Lord, joyful, patient, prayer, distributing to the needs of the saints, given to hospitality' (v. 13). From this verse we can see that hospitality means helping others with needs. We are concerned about others and help them with whatever need they

A soldier was telling of a serious wound he received in battle. Someone asked, "Did you fall?" He replied, "No, my buddies saw I was hurt and so they gathered so close around me that I couldn't fall." Now that is hospitality! Christians are those who care so much that they gather so close around a friend that they can't fall even though they have suffered a loss. Someone said, "A friend is someone who steps in when others step out." That is hospitality.

God gave instruction to Israel as to the reason they were to show hospitality (Leviticus 19:33-34). He said, "You be hospitable to strangers because you were strangers once." How were they to treat the stranger? They were to treat him like kinfolks. All of us have that unusual cousin, but we treat him with love, because he is family. Here Moses is telling them to do the same thing. It sounds like he is telling them to practice the Golden Rule (Matthew 7:12).

The story is told of a rich man feeling that he was without friends. He said that at his death he would divide his fortune among his friends, if only he knew who they were. Years passed and he died. His death occurred in the middle

God's Plan of Salvation

I had thought that I might enjoy having one but I never dreamed that someone would give me a GPS, but they did.

Much to my surprise, some of my children gave me a GPS for a Christmas present. A son took

charge of getting the thing ready for me to use in my car. He put the address of a local business into the GPS and this lady's v o i c e instructed me when where to turn in



order to get to my destination as I looked at a map where I was to travel.

In case you might not be familiar with this gadget, here is a brief definition: "The Global Positioning System (GPS) is a satellite-based navigation system made up of a network of 24 satellites placed into orbit by the U.S. Department of Defense. GPS was originally intended for military applications, but in the 1980s, the government made the system available for civilian use. GPS works in any weather conditions, anywhere in the world, 24 hours a day." Theoretically I should never get lost while traveling when I use my GPS.

In the beginning of man's existence on earth he was in a safe place and in a perfect relationship with Jehovah God. In a sense man was not saved because he had never been in a lost condition. But he became estranged from his God and in a lost condition because of disobedience to the commands given to him from God (Genesis 2:15-17; Isaiah 59:1,2; Romans 5:12).

However, in the darkest day of man's existence in the beautiful Garden of Eden, God's plan for man's salvation is found in Genesis 3:15 when the "seed of woman" was mentioned. The "seed" is also referred to as being the "seed" of Abraham. The apostle Paul defined that "seed" as being Jesus Christ (Galatians 3:19, 16). The fact is, Jesus Christ, the Lamb of God was referred to by John in Revelation 13:8 as being "slain from the foundation of the world."

The Lord God, in His infinite wisdom, foreknowledge and marvelous grace and love, planned aforetime to provide salvation for mankind through the death of His

beloved Son (Hebrews 2:9; Ephesians 2:5,8; John 3:16).

Throughout the Old Testament there is the theme that 'someone is coming' and that being the promised Messiah who would bring salvation to the human race. Isaiah, the messianic prophet,

> prophesied hundreds of years before the coming of the Savior: "Therefore the Lord Himself will give you a sign: Behold, the virgin shall conceive and bear a Son, and shall call His

name Immanuel" (Isaiah 7:14); and His name was to be called Jesus "for He will save His people from their sins" (Matthew 1:21).

Jesus, in answering Thomas who asked Him, "Lord, we do not know where You are going, and how can we know the way?" said, "I am the way, the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through Me" (John 14:5, 6). The roadmap that leads to salvation and to the Father is found in the person of Jesus Christ. He is the only way (Acts 4:12)! So He says to all who would be His disciples, "If anyone desires to come after Me, let him deny himself and take up his cross and follow me" (Matthew 16:24). The way that Jesus leads us is "narrow" and "difficult" but the reward is eternal life (NKJV, Matthew 7:13, 14). God has given perfect and complete directions in His Holy Word that will lead us to Jesus Christ and salvation (Psalms 119:105; John 6:44, 45; 2 Timothy 3:16, 17; 2 Peter 1:2-4).

God's plan of salvation certainly involves man's response. A person must believe that Jesus Christ is the Son of God (John 8:24); repent of sins (Acts 17:30) and based upon a confession of faith in Christ, be immersed in His name for the remission of sins (Romans 10:9, 10; Mark 16:16; Acts 2:38).

Following in the steps of the Savior we will never stray from the way that is infallibly safe and secure and that leads to "the everlasting kingdom of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ" (2 Peter 1:10, 11). May our attitude always be as found in the song, "Where He Leads Me I Will Follow".

Gloster Street Building <u>and</u> Church More Visible to the Community

Removal of two houses on the south side opened up the visibility of the church building. A very entergetic evangelistic program opens wider the outreach of the church to the community.of Tupelo in North Mississippi.

Driving north on Gloster Street in Tupelo, Mississippi, we noticed that something looked different about the church building owned and used by the church of Christ. The building seemed to be more noticeable than ever before.

According to preacher Chad Ramsey, not only is the church building more noticeable (due to the removal of two houses on the south side), the church itself is becoming more visible to the city and county. We were excited to learn of their evangelistic efforts involving several means of outreach they are using in Lee County's largest city.

In addition to a schedule of weekly services, the Gloster Street congregation sends out approximately **15,000 copies** of "Heart to Heart/House to House" every two months -- reaching virtually every home in the city. Regular TV programs ("DaySpring") featuring one of the elders, **James Segars**, is telecast on several outlets, especially in NE Mississippi.

Radio spots are run daily, along with a 30 minute weekly program on Tupelo's "SuperTalk" station. Every Monday, a newspaper Bible teaching article reaches out to readers of the "Daily Journal." An active jail ministry has been responsible for thousands of Bible Correspondence Courses.

All of these efforts are designed to open doors for personal teaching. The local preacher stated, "We are seeking to hit every avenue we can to reach people with the gospel."

In addition to great emphasizes placed on local evangelism, the church is actively involved in foreign and stateside missions.

Estherville, Iowa benefits from the evangelistic efforts of the Gloster Street church. A campaign was held there last year and, again this year, 41 persons have made known their plans to travel to Iowa with the gospel message in a meeting scheduled for June 10 - 15

Preacher Ramsey expressed gratitude to God for the financial ability and readiness to give liberally -- enabling the Gloster Street church to be heavily involved in mission efforts at home and away. He is well aware of the fact that ability increases responsibility.

The Gloster Street church of Christ in Tupelo is, in one respect, an "old church" -- soon to celebrate 100 years of service (established in 1914). There is another sense in which the church is, in reality, a "young congregation". True, there are many older, faithful members, but the church is made up largely of younger families. For instance, brother Chad said that a typical Wednesday night service of 180 would likely include 85 children.

Average attendance at Gloster Street in recent months shows 215 for Sunday mornings, 186 on Sunday nights and 171 on Wednesday evenings.

This more visible building and church which meets within its walls is presently served by four capable elders, James Segars, Gary Martin, Monte Key and Wayne Washington. Their pulpit preacher for the past 5 1/2 years is Chad Ramsey. Brian Galloway also serves as one of the ministers. Andrea O'Rear is secretary. Four deacons assist in the vital and visible work. (alf, editor)

Christians at Antioch Conduct Gospel Meeting

Brother Clark's well prepared lesson was on the *Conversion of Cornelius*. Using the Centurion of Caesarea as a example, B. J. effectively pointed out that it takes more than morality to be saved and that one can be devoutly religious and yet be in a lost condition. According to the scriptures (Acts 10 & 11) Cornelius was both very religious and highly moral; yet, he

was lost and in need of salvation which could come only through knowledge of and faithful obedience to Christ.

Meet Sid Williams, an elder in the Philadelphia Church of Christ

Williams Brothers' Country Store at Williamsville, near Philadelphia, Mississippi, was established, in 1907, by brothers Amzie and Brown Williams. The old general store (business) is now more than 100 years old. We understand the present store building was built in 1923.

Over years, ownership and managment of the "ole country store" has passed from one generation to the next -- but, still in the family! At the time of our visit, we were privileged to visit with present co-owners Jane Crosswhite and Sid Williams. (We understand that Jane and Sid are first cousins and that Jane's mother, Peggy Dees, is also still involved in the family business.) We were introduced to Sid's son, John; and, as you might guess, he too, works in the family store.

We enjoyed briefly visiting with Jane. We were especially pleased that Sid Williams was able to take out time to give us a tour of the sprawling business. And, to put it mildly, "It was an interesting adventure." We were greatly impressed with the friendliness of

the workers (upwards to 50 or more employees!).

We were also amazed with the vast variety of merchandise available for purchase in the store. At Williams Brothers you can buy most anything you want -- groceries, clothes, shoes, seed, feed, bales of hay, nails and barbed wire. The store still offers items like galvanized washboards, cowboy boots, horse collars and saddles. Planters can also purchase nursery stock plants or seeds measured from old fashioned bins.

Readers of the MM may be interested in knowing that Sid Williams and his family are members of the church of Christ in Philadelphia, where Sid serves as one of the church elders. Brother Sid informed us that even in the midst of these "hard times" their business is still very good. For example, it is common for the store to sell 1,000 pounds of sliced bacon every day. (It is sliced right before the eyes of the customer.) It is not unusual to sell 10 containers of "hoop cheese", each containing 20 to 25 pounds. (And, yes, they will slice the cheese for vou while vou watch!) Hams sell good. Fryers go fast. We were introduced to meat cutter Tommy

Lee Kelly who has worked in the store for the past 35 years.

We are thankful to report there are two things that you *cannot* buy at Williams Brothers' Store. We were told they *do not sell beer or cigarettes*. They have found to have a good business you do not have to sell either one. Also, the store is also not open on Sundays.

I did do some shopping at Williams Brothers. In addition to so many other items, the store has the cutest baby clothes. I purchased two little outfits for Braylee Grace, our little great-granddaughter. Williams Brothers also sells plants and flowers. Yes, I purchased three yellow Knockout Roses. "Good price too."

If you have never been to Williams Brothers "Ole Country Store" in Williamsville, you may enjoy going over to Philadelphia, Mississippi. And, I promise you, if you do visit the store, you will be amazed. There is nothing like it anywhere the area; and, if you stop by and go in, you will not likely come out empty handed. 

John 6 is a great chapter in a great book. In it we have recorded two of Jesus' seven miracles (signs) chosen by John for the main part of his work (Vv. 1 – 21) and one of the seven powerful "I Am" statements of Christ (Vv. 35, 48) which reveal His divine nature and benevolent character. Also in the chapter is a powerful confession of faith in Christ (Vv. 68, 69) which rivals others found elsewhere in the Gospels.

From that marvelous con-

fession, I want to lift up Peter's question: "To whom shall we go?" At the time it was

Who decides what we believe and practice in matters of faith in religion? Is our authority from heaven or from men (Luke 20: 1 – 8)?

asked, it was a rhetorical question used by Peter to emphatically point out that there was indeed no other one to whom they could turn for the ultimate answers in life. If the Christ, the Son of the living God, had words of eternal life, where else could one turn?

The question "To whom shall we go?" can serve to cause the thoughtful to examine the true source to which they turn for ultimate answers in the important matters of life. Do we really turn to Christ's words for guidance and help in all areas of serious concern, or in the critical time, do we turn elsewhere?

Who decides what we believe and practice in matters of faith in religion? Is our authority from heaven or from men (Luke 20: 1 – 8)? Someone or something is the final authority for every doctrine and practice, whether recognized or not.

Shall we turn to ourselves? Will we decide about doctrines and practices based on inner feelings, intuition and experience? In spite of the warnings of Scriptures that "the way of man is not in himself" (Jeremiah 10: 23), and that the heart is disparately "deceitful" to the point of being unknowable (Jeremiah 17: 9), there are still so many whose final authority is human based.

Without reference to the words of Jesus in the Bible concerning his will, they pursue various aspects of religious service based on how they feel ("It just feels so spiritual"), their intuition ("I just know it's the right thing to do") and their own experience ("This is what I have seen and heard.")

The wisdom of men is flawed and is contrary to the wisdom of God (1 Corinthians 1: 18 - 2: 5). Even where esteemed Christians are concerned, no matter how learned or pious they may be, their

wisdom is hindered by humanity. They may point in the direction of serious study of the words of

Christ, but their conclusions must stand the rigid test of Scriptures properly handled (2 Timothy 2: 15). Just because "Brother X" says it or even "the brethren have always

heard.")

said" cannot not be the ultimate answer in our quest for faithfulness and eternal life.

Shall we turn to the Christ? Peter and the others knew the answer because they had come to "believe and know" that Jesus was indeed "the Christ, the Son of the living God" (John 6: 69). The words of Christ are the words of God Himself (John 17: 8). His words are the words of One who has all authority (Matthew 28: 18 – 20) and who safe-guarded those words to his apostles (John 14: 26; 16: 13), who eventually wrote them down under the guidance of the Holy Spirit.

Selected writings of the apostles and other men were recognized as Spirit-given and were deemed worthy to be included in the New Testament canon of Scriptures. The apostles' doctrine (Acts 2: 42) guided the early church in all matters of faith and practice, and must do so today.

The more the world attacks the nature and authority of the New Testament documents and questions our ability to know what Jesus really said and did not say, the more men and women will turn to other sources for authority in religious faith. We, as disciples of our Lord, must reaffirm over and

over that we have in fact the words of Christ f a i t h f u l l y recorded and that we can know His authoritative will for us.


CORINTH-BATESVILLE

Comer D. (Buck) Hall, Jr. was born on May 20, 1935, in Myrtlewood, AL, and died peacefully in his home on February 14, 2009. Buck is pictured with his loving wife of 51 years, Sylvia Clearman Hall. He spent his youth in Meridian, MS, and then served his country in the Army. In 1957, he married Sylvia and moved to New Orleans, LA. His love for his wife, children and grandchildren was obvious to all who had the privilege of meeting

Buck was a gospel preacher for 38 years. He graduated from Whites Ferry Road School of Preaching in 1974, received a BA in Bible in 1976; an MA in 1979; and a Master of Divinity in 1990 from the Alabama Christian School of Religion Montgomery, AL.

He served several churches Christ throughout the Southeast, including Gatesville, TX; McCrory, AR; Hattiesburg, MS; and the Vancleave, MS church from 2003 until his passing.

Buck also spent five years as Academic Dean of Bible Studies at Bear Valley Bible institute in Kramatorsk, Ukraine. Many who visited quickly learned of the reputation of Buck as he enabled men in the Ukraine to spread the Gospel of Jesus Christ preachers teachers.

Buck had a zest for life. He played the piano, golfed, and fished for entertainment. He was always well dressed. As his time on earth drew to a close, Sylvia was trying to help him dress to attend what turned out to be his last worship assembly with the Vancleave church. He raised quite a fuss over the suit, shirt and tie she had, reminding her of his previous selection. Sylvia figured out his problem, despite his confusion from the pain and medication, and told him. "We're just going to worship, not to your

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
Church Street Church A Sunday Evening Visit in Pontotoc

Hungering and Thirsting After Righteousness

What do we think when we read the words of Jesus, "Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they shall be filled" (Mt. 5:6)? How many of us really hunger and thirst after righteousness? How many people do we know who are that dedicated to Jesus?

Several weeks ago, John Dial (a medical doctor/preacher) and I had the privilege to be with a large group of Christians in San Christobal, Mexico, who truly seemed to hunger and thirst after righteousness. This was evident, first of all, in what they did to be present with fellow Christians who were coming together for a lectureship/gospel meeting.

Some drove 16 to 18 hours for fellowship with their Christian brothers and sisters and to be strengthened by the preaching of the word of God. Most could not afford a motel and, if they could have, most of the motels were full because of the holiday events that were taking place throughout the city. The brethren were not deterred by something so trite as this. They were determined to be there, so they slept in cars, in the back of trucks, on hard wooden benches, in the upper floor of the church building, etc.

Some walked. Some came in the beds of pickup trucks and one family of four came on a motorcycle. Their dedication to the Lord and concern for lost souls was evident in all they did and said.

I did not speak nor understand much of the language, but prayers prayed with sobs and concern evidenced the fervent prayers of righteous men. Some were dressed rather well, some were in common garb, and some didn't even have a pair of shoes; yet, their displays of affection to everyone showed that they were genuine Christians who did not let any differences in financial status cloud their love for Christ and His people. Hugs and kisses were commonplace and, when it was time to leave, tears were shed in abundance.

The church was established in the state of Chiapas, Mexico some eighteen years ago. A young man, David Aguillar, fresh out of preacher school, went there to preach the gospel and establish the church. He was asked such questions as: "Do you have any family there?" "Why do you want to go there?" He had no relatives living there. He was not even

married. His reason to go to Chiapas was that there were no known Christians there. He wanted to save souls. Today he is married and has three loving children, but he has not ceased in his desire to bring souls to Jesus.

There is no way of knowing how many have obeyed the gospel as a result of Brother David's work. The number has to be in the thousands. In fact, David has, himself, established more than forty different congregations and is baptizing people almost on a daily basis. Of course, most of those who are taught continue the enthusiasm and bring their friends, relatives, and acquaintances to hear the gospel as well.

Some of the men have been to preaching schools and are now teaching and preaching farther away. We can very astutely say, "The field is white unto harvest." As with any harvest, though, there are thieves poised to steal some of the fruit. That may be in the form of animals or even crafty grain elevator attendants with a physical harvest.


Spiritually, the theft has come in the form of divisive brethren in the United States who are Pharisaical in some of their ideas and have sought to divide the church and claim some of the fruit for themselves. flock that is under your care, serving as overseers — not because you must, but because you are willing, as God wants you to be; not greedy for money, but eager to serve; not lording it over those entrusted to you, but being examples to the flock" (1 Peter 5:1-3).

The Bible uses four different Greek terms to refer to this important leadership role in the local church. An elder or presbyter (Gk, presbyteros, Acts 20:17) is simply a mature, godly man whose character over time makes him a worthy example to other believers. A shepherd or pastor (Gk, poimen, Acts 20:28) is someone who feeds, nurtures, and otherwise tends to the needs of God's flock.

An overseer or bishop (Gk, episkopos, Acts 20:28) is one who pays attention to, supervises, and otherwise

provides guidance for the activity of the larger group. Finally, a steward of God (Gk, oikonomos, Titus 1:7) is one who cares for and looks after the day-to-day needs of the local household of faith, which belongs not to him, but to God. Each term is to be thought of and applied in terms of humility and nurturing, guidance and empowering, love and equipping.

We are excited about our new shepherds and the Godly leadership that they will provide for the local Bypass Family. They are here as loving servants to lead us in the direction of God in the twenty-first century. Please come and meet them and the entire Bypass Family. There are no strangers here; just friends we have not met.

United States during the 1950's and I believe it is the fastest growing religious group in Chiapas, Mexico today. Let us pray that what has happened to us will not happen to them. Let us also pray that our people in this country will once again hunger and thirst for righteousness.

May the Bible, once again, become more important than the comfort of the recliner. May the soul of our next door neighbor, once again, become more important than his new Lexus. May Bible stories be on our minds more than the stories seen on television. And may our family's spiritual welfare become more important than their physical wellbeing

In a culture that doesn't have much of the "stuff" that consumes all our

time and interests, God becomes more important than anything else. "What shall it profit a man if he gain the whole world and lose his own soul?" May we learn this before it is too late!

The fruits of the labors of our brothers and sisters in Chiapas revealed themselves in the attendance at the assemblies of that evangelistic effort and in the responses of those present. Daytime attendance was estimated to be 300 to 400. Nightly attendance was 500 to 600. It is estimated that at least twelve hundred different people made up the overall attendance.

Three meals were served every day by the ladies who cooked outside with an open fire under a tin shed and assembled the food in a room off the auditorium. Three times a day they

converted the auditorium into a dining hall and then into an auditorium and after the last service of the day, all the chairs were folded and the floors were swept and mopped. Many were there from seven o'clock in the morning until twelve o'clock each night. Everyone did his part, even young children.

In response to the gospel message, eighteen precious souls were baptized into Christ and several more a day or two afterward. Twenty-two to twenty-four were restored to faithful fellowship in the Lord's church. We were truly blessed to have been in the presence of such a throng of dedicated brothers and sisters in the Lord. of a winter blizzard. His last request was that his funeral be held at 4:00 a.m. and be a graveside service. During his life time many people claimed to be his friend, but when the funeral came only three men and one poor woman came to the service, to show their respects and love. When the rich man's will was read, it directed that his vast fortune be equally given to those who attended his funeral. Why? Because he knew his true friends would mourn his passing and be at the service. Christians mourn with those who are mourning (1 Corinthians 12). That is hospitality in the true sense of the word!

The classic example of hospitality is Abraham entertaining the three angels unaware (Genesis 18:1-8). He had three visitors to come. He washed their feet, killed the fatted calf, and had a great meal for these strangers. They were there to tell him about his promised son. The Hebrew writer tells us to practice hospitality because we might entertain angles unaware (Hebrews 13:2).

In Edwin Markham's lovely poem, "The Shoes of Happiness," Conrad, the old cobbler, dreamed one night that the Lord would sometime come to be his guest. When the dawn came he arose and decorated his little shop with bright and beautiful flowers in anticipation of the great event. "When the Lord comes," he said to himself, "I will wash His feet where the spikes have been and I will kiss the hands that have been punctured by the nails." But the Lord did not come. A beggar came, and Conrad gave him a pair of shoes. An old woman came bent with the weight of a heavy burden. He lifted the load from her back and gave her food. Finally, just before the day was about to fade into darkness, a little child cameher eyes wet with tears. In pity, Conrad led her back to her mother. But the divine guest never came. Then soft in the silence a voice he heard: "Lift up your heart, for I kept my word. Three times I came to your friendly door. Three times my shadow was on your floor. I was the beggar with bruised feet. I was the woman you gave to eat. I was the child in the homeless street" (Matthew 25:40). We must practice hospitality if we are to be like Jesus.

How can we practice hospitality? Very simply have the attitude of opening our home and our heart to the needs of others. For many years Clarence I Power of Marietta, Georgia had been confined to his bed, much of the time unable to move any part of his body. One day he conceived

the idea of a special "Shut-in's Day" and forthwith inaugurated plans to make it an international affair. The movement took hold quickly and now the first Sunday in June of each year is set aside to visit the sick and shut-ins, to send them cards and flowers and otherwise bring cheer to this great host of people. Mr. Powers, who is now able to sit up in bed, is usually surrounded by his tracts, greeting cards, magazines, telephone, computer, correspondence list, letters and his Bible and is a happy man despite his affliction.

Hospitality is an attitude of the heart. It is the attitude that we are ready at all time to give to others and serve their needs.

Nurture Every Spark

As a Boy Scout I was taught how to start a fire with a flint stone and some carefully protected shavings for tinder, even when rain had dampened whatever sticks and fallen timber might be available for fuel. A spark was struck into the dry shavings and then very carefully shielded from the rain and wind, tenderly blown upon until a tiny flame would glow. Then more shavings were gingerly pushed toward the flame so that they too would catch, until the fire grew large enough and hot enough to ignite the damp wood that could make the needed larger fire.

It was a tedious process. Impatience could result in the early spark dying, the fire's flame flickering out. The scant supply of dry tinder might be all used. Nothing could then be done with just a flint stone and wet sticks. Nurture that little early spark carefully!

So in dealing with those we would restore to repentance; we should accept every indication of turning and encourage and nurture it.

A person who had not been attending services for a number of years began attending again. She was told she could not be counted as a member again until she went forward and confessed sin. The little spark died out before it could burst into flame.

A person who had been in a congregation using instrumental music desired to leave it and worship with an a cappella congregation. He could only be accepted if he would come forward and confess sin, he was told. The flickering flame went out.

A Worthwhile Goal

"My brothers, if anyone among you wanders from the truth and someone brings him back, let him know that whoever brings back a sinner from his wandering will save his soul from death and will cover a multitude of sins" (James 5:19-20).

Each person needs to be dealt with according to his or her level of maturity and what we may know of their heart and disposition. As Jude, the brother of James and perhaps of the Lord, said, "And have mercy on those who doubt; save others by snatching them out of the fire; to others show mercy with fear, hating even the garment stained by the flesh" (Jude 22-23).

The commandments of the Lord relating to church discipline need to be obeyed, but like all of his commandments, they need to be obeyed in the way he commanded, for the reasons he commanded, and always in a spirit of love for all involved.

Sunday Night Gathering at Gautier

Sunday evening, March 8, 2009, was a memorable evening for my June and me. Just a little before six o'clock, we walked into the neat and functional meeting place of Christ's church in Gautier, Mississippi. (It sounds like the local folks pronounce the name "Gautier" as "Go-Shay").

As I recall, the very first person we met was a lady named Mitchell. She just happened to be the sweet wife of a great gentleman and dedicated preacher we have been privileged to know for many years -- **Dorice Mitchell.**

For decades, brother Mitchell has preached on the Mississippi Gulf Coast. For many years, he served well as the preacher for the Central church in Pascagoula. His effective work continued until the years sorta "caught up with him" and he decided to "retire." However, not long after he "retired", he accepted the challenge of "filling in" at Gautier -- about ten miles west of Pascagoula. That was ten or eleven (or was it sixteen?) years ago. He is still "filling in."

As one might expect, singing was a major part of the evening service. Song leader **Allen Born** led us in challenging one another as we sang "Hold to God's Unchanging Hand." Then, in another song, we were reminded of the affirmative answer to the vital question, "Does Jesus Care?"

Afterwards, an opening prayer to God, led by **Pete Hankins**, humbly expressed gratitude to God for the Gautier congregation where, as brother Pete said, "peace and harmony prevails."

Then, just before the evening sermon, brother Allen asked that we turn in our song books to number 722. Following our leader, we called upon each other to, "Let the Beauty of Jesus be Seen in You." For some reason, the words of the third verse of that song seemed to have a special meaning on the night of our visit. It says,

"From the dawn of morning,
To close of day;
In example, in deeds,
In all you say;
Lay your gifts at his feet,
Ever strive to keep sweet;
Let the beauty of Jesus
Be seen in you."

After brother Born announced the invitational hymn, the not-so-young preacher named Mitchell stepped into the pulpit -- well prepared to present a thought provoking and stirring lesson. His sermon was entitled, "The Lost ['Bible'] Book" and was based on the account found in 2 Kings 22 and 2 Chronicles 34. Skillfully, the experienced preacher showed the power of the *written word* of God upon the life of a king and that of his kingdom.

The inspired record related how that God's written law for His people had been "lost" for a long time. When the law was found in the house of the Lord by Hilkiah the high priest, it's message was shared with Shaphan, the scribe, who then went into the presence of King Josiah and read the law to him.

When the king heard the words of the "Bible" [law to Israel] he was greatly disturbed. He realized that he and his people had not been living according to the will of God. The king then had the law read to "all of the people, both small and great." (23:2)

As a result of "Bible reading" the king led the nation in a great "restoration movement." This brought about repentance and a renewal, on the part of the people, to serve God as directed in His written word -- that written word which had been lost, but was found!

It was a forceful and practical lesson reminding us of the power of the **Word**, the *seed* of the kingdom, and how, though it be misplaced, when found and followed, the amazing results of restoration are accomplished. The sermon was effectively presented by a preacher who, although he is past eighty in years, has not lost his touch in the pulpit.

The evening gathering in Gautier also included a special time of fellowship following the services. After a rather lengthy time together, as we departed to our motor home (in a park, about 2 miles away), we were much encouraged as we reflected on the good services and the great sermon. It was another one of those memorable evenings with [spiritual] family. We are grateful. (alf/ mjf)

Dear Brethren,

Nancy and I, since 1989, have been involved in local work on the Gulf coast of Mississippi and Louisiana, as well as holding Evangelism Seminars, Gospel Campaigns and Marriage Seminars. The Church of Christ in Bogalusa, Louisiana found themselves without a preacher for over three years and prayed that someone would come and work with them. Due to three factories moving out of town, the congregation suffered a sizable exodus. There were around 12 brethren when we started preaching on Sunday mornings and holding bible class on Wednesday nights. We started working with them full time March 1st of 2008. Bogalusa is now averaging around 31 in attendance. They want to be evangelistic and are willing to carry the gospel to family and friends but need encouragement and direction along with your support.

The Bogalusa Church of Christ owns it's building and has no debt. The real concern was that they were only a funeral or two away from closing their doors. We have had some converts and it is breathing life back into the work here in Bogalusa. We believe this is a golden opportunity for the church to grow once again in Bogalusa. Also this would be a great state side mission work for someone to be involved in and share with us in the preaching of the gospel.

Of course we will need your help in this effort. Kensington Woods Church of Christ, will have to back out of their major commitment to the work by April 1st of 2009. Commitment to their Tanzania mission work in Africa and the fact that some of their major contributors have moved, they have decided at this time not to continue their support for the work in Bogalusa. This was a hard decision for them as Nancy and I have been so involved with Kensington Woods over the past two years and eight months and the elders are my close personal friends.

This leaves us looking for help to support this work. We need only a few congregations to help with a monthly contribution of \$100.00 or more. We have a short fall of \$1,000.00 a month to finalize and complete our monthly support. Would you please consider helping.

The town is 13,500 in population and 40,000 in surrounding area, with the demographics being 50% black and 50% white. What is interesting is that the Bogalusa congregation has the same demographic make up as the community.

Please help us with this wonderful opportunity for the next 5 to 8 years. We believe that we could be self-supporting or very close by the end of 5 years. Please, we are asking for your help. Please consider having Nancy and I come and visit with you concerning this work. Your monthly support is greatly needed.



=""Have You Considered...?"

The title for this article comes from a question that God. Himself asked Satan long ago. It is found in Job 1:8. In the previous verse God had asked Satan where he had come from. It



God then brought His servant, Job, to Satan's attention. After God's high regard for Job is voiced, Satan attacks his integrity suggesting that Job only serves God because God has blessed him richly. So begins the "testing" of Job's faith in God.

Since this article is not intended to be an in-depth study of the events of Job, we will conclude here by referring to two verses. The first is Job 1:22, "In all this Job did not sin nor charge God with wrong." ². The second is Job 42:12, "Now the LORD blessed the latter days of Job more than his beginning ...

As I said, this article isn't so much a discourse on Job as it is some thoughts on the phrase "Have you considered...?" Perhaps it will do us good to slow down for a moment and consider some things.

Have you considered - God is still in control. Man has demonstrated a tendency to forget this very important fact. Just ask king Nebuchadnezzar of Daniel chapter 4 about God's dominion. In verse 17 we read, "This decision is by the decree of the watchers, And the sentence by the word of the holy ones, In order that the living may know that the Most High rules in the kingdom of men, gives it to whomever He will. And sets over it the lowest of men." This was proclaimed with an announcement that the king would live as a beast until he knew "that the Most High rules in the Kingdom of men, and gives it to whomever He chooses." (vs. 25). Though there is much discussion today about those in places of authority over us, let us consider the fact that God is still in control.

Have you considered - the providence of God. Possibly one of the most vivid displays of God's providence is seen in the life of Joseph (Genesis 37-50). With the twists and turns and unexpected events, his life was like a rollercoaster ride. However, there was one thing that stayed

constant - Joseph never left God and God never left Joseph. Twice in Genesis chapter 39 it says that "the LORD was with Joseph" (vs. 2 and 21). In the midst of the uncertainty around Christians find

great comfort in knowing that God is with us working in ways we cannot see nor understand.

Have you considered - God opens doors. The Lord told the church at Philadelphia that He had set before them an "open door, and no one can shut it." (Revelation 3:8). This was encouraging to the brethren of the first century and should be for us as well today. God is the one in control of opening doors. It is up to us to step through them when He opens them.

Have you considered -Magnolia Bible College is still preparing preachers and training teachers. For over 30 years MBC has helped men and women step through the doors that God has opened to allow them to be better servants in His church. Over 15 years ago, God opened a door for me. Through His providence and care I was able to enroll at MBC and begin preaching the Gospel of Christ. I have not regretted that decision one moment. Though at times I did not know exactly how the story was going to unfold, I took it on faith that as long as I was serving God to the best of my ability, I would be blessed richly. I assure you that I have witnessed that very fact in my life over and

It may be that you know of someone who is currently in uncertain territory. Maybe it is you, yourself. A lost job or cutback in hours has brought an unexpected change. Perhaps you have thought in times past about the possibility of preaching or getting a sound Bible education but your situation would not allow you to do so.

A Christian Woman Faces Dilemma About Christmas

The winter holiday season (December 25, *Christmas*) has passed. And, as in every Christmas season since I became a Christian, I face the same dilemma. Should I celebrate the "Christmas" Holiday"?

Midwinter celebrations had their beginning before the birth of Christ. Ancient pagan festivals and many human traditions, reflected in the modern celebration of the birth of Jesus Christ on December 25th, did not become widely accepted or popular until more recent times. Diligent Bible students know that the Holy Scriptures do not mention the day called "Christmas" and are aware that first century Christians did not observe or celebrate the birth of Christ on December 25th -- or any other specific day of the year.

The celebration of Christmas has been controversial since its inception. Numerous festivities associated with Christmas have their roots in pagan practices and have often been frowned upon by conservatives within the church. The modern practice of feasting, gift-giving and frequent excesses seem to present a drastic contrast with the simplicity of the birth of our Lord. Many frown upon such practices, believing them to be contrary to the true spirit of Christmas. It comes at no surprise that believers in Jesus are often upset that the Christmas Season. to them, is not "as religious as it was meant to be." However, many seem to forget that Christmas was not celebrated by the earliest of Christians and is, in reality, not mentioned even once in the New Testament.

Early churches had not annually celebrated the birth of Christ until Telesphorus, who was said to be "the second Bishop of Rome" (from 125 to 136 A.D), declared that church services should be held to celebrate the Nativity of our Lord and Saviour. However, since no one was quite sure in which month Christ was born, the nativity celebration was often held in September. In fact, for many years, people observed the birth of Jesus on various dates. however, in 320 A.D. the man called "Pope Julius" specified the 25th of December as the official date of the birth of Jesus Christ.

Among churches of Christ, special worship services celebrating Christmas are usually not conducted. Many even forgo the singing of "Christmas carols" in December. The celebration of Christmas among members of the New Testament church is considered to be more of a tradition or "family thing" and is not looked upon as a spiritual holy day. Their

desire to not be confused with the denominational world is shown in efforts to refuse the religious practice of anything which is not taught in the word of God. Yet, we usually exchange gifts with family and friends and often hold "Christmas parties" in our homes, offices and church fellowship halls. I often wonder how the denominational world views our "partial" celebration of the holiday tradition.

Should we celebrate this holiday called "Christ-mass"? Admittedly, the season is a time of kindness to others, sharing blessings, and enjoying fellowship with family and friends. But, should not these things, along with the celebration of the miraculous birth of our Lord and Savior, be all year long? Would it be more appropriate, maybe, to call this traditional holiday (December 25) "Winter Solstice" or something similar? Is talking about the Nativity and singing carols during December wrong in the sight of God? By the way, when was the last time you heard a Bible class lesson or sermon on the birth of Jesus the Christ?

MBC StudentsInvited to ConductMeeting in Millport





Kosciusko Church Celebrates 75 Years of Service

A LITTLE HISTORY

South Huntington Street Church

The Church of Christ had its beginning in Kosciusko in 1934. After using various places to meet for services, a house on North Madison Street was secured for the church's use. In 1947 this building was sold and a lot was purchased and a tent meeting was held. During time of the construction of a building the church met in the high school. In January of 1949, the building was complete enough for the church to begin meeting there. It was located on Jackson Street.

In January of 1970, the current building was completed and services were begun on S. Huntington Street and the Kosciusko church became known as the S. Huntington Church of Christ. A major expansion of these facilities was begun in the late 90's and we began to use the new addition in 2000

The first elders were W. A. Bryant, George Wallace, and T. A. Davis. The first deacons were Dallas Champion, Denver Bell and Roland Nash. A number of good spiritual men have served this church as elders and deacons over the years. One of most significant accomplishments of the S. Huntington church was the establishment of Magnolia Bible College. The men serving as elders spearheading that effort were J. B. Hayes, Al Franks, and Marlin Ivey. Our current elders are Jim Dendy, John Gardner and Dewey Lawrence.

As near as we can tell, over the last 75 years this church has been served by 22 preachers. We list them here for your information. They may or may not be in order. We do know that Paul D. Murphy was the first full-time preacher. He was followed by George Long, Joe Tucker, Howard Wooldrige, Bill Rogers, J. R. Collins, Carlos Gunter, Breland Collier, Wayne Mitchell, Stacy Carter, Paul Sparks, Charles Curtis, Charles Cash, Hoyt Hathcock, Everette Day, Sr., Rod Tate, Al Franks, John Pigg, Don Jackson, Greg Beachamp, Les Ferguson, Sr., Ken Salley, and Les Ferguson, Sr. All of these men have played a significant in the growth development this of congregation. We are so very thankful for each one. If you count them, there are 23, but I am blessed to be this church's preacher for the second time
